Message from the Shelter Manager

Shelter or Rescue? When people hear stories about CASA's work, that very question comes up. The answer can be different depending on who is answering it. Really, a "shelter" is a safe place that harbors animals that need a temporary place to live and a "rescue" is seen as an organization that is literally rescuing animals that need them most even when they know the road might not be easy. So when CASA supporters are asked that same question, we will tell you that we are both. CASA may have a physical shelter building and we care for stray animals from Camano Island, but we truly operate like a rescue organization.

We take animals that are ill, scared, abused, abandoned, or simply find themselves with no other place to go. We then do everything we can to bring them to a stage where they can be adopted into a loving home. Some take longer than others, but that is okay. We at CASA take our commitment to the animals very seriously when they are with us - and long after. Even after an adoption we encourage adopters to keep in touch with us and that we hope we are their first call if they have any questions or need any help with their animal. We put so much into every animal we adopt out that, if for any reason an adopter cannot keep their adopted CASA pet, we will take them back regardless of the time that has passed. If a CASA pet ever finds themselves displaced again - we are here. If that isn't "rescue", I don't know what is. So if you are talking to someone about our amazing little organization be sure to describe us as a rescue with a shelter that makes the commitment of a lifetime. One of the most important things that CASA does is to provide surgery and extraordinary care for those animals that come to us with special needs. This is the story of two such animals, whose lives were significantly improved or even saved by this service.

Sky came to us incredibly sick, and in need of a costly emergency surgery. She was suffering from a very bad case of untreated Pyometra (infection of the uterus). We first attempted to help her owners find a foster-based rescue organization to help, but they found no other help so we took her in as a surrender. She arrived at CASA in severe pain, and with an abdomen full of fluid. While we knew that she was very ill, it quickly became apparent that she was much sicker than we initially thought, and needed immediate surgery. She was moved to a staff person's car and taken over to our waiting vet. We all knew she would be lucky to survive the emergency surgery and if she did, we would still struggle to keep her alive. She was transferred to the weekend and evening ER clinic that afternoon.

After the surgery, many people followed her progress on Facebook and eagerly waited for updates. They learned how she had settled in at the clinic, and how Sky was monitored for potential kidney issues and dehydration. Caring staff members from CASA went often to check in on her progress and continued updating Facebook with her status. The staff members were happy to see that she was interacting more with them, and that her temperature was regulating. People

anxiously waited until she began eating and drinking again, and was weaned from a high protein IV drip. This was a hard journey, with the staff working diligently and creatively to tempt her to eat hoping it would eventually pay off.

Finally, Sky came back to CASA, slowly began to eat, and began to enjoy her recovery time in the front office. Sky is now available for adoption, thanks to your generous donations and to the "Giving Tuesday" Above and Beyond project that provided funds for surgery and extraordinary care. Thanks also for all of the thoughts offered on Sky's behalf during her surgery and recovery.

Sonya came to CASA as a senior cat with seemingly minor geriatric problems. Shortly after her arrival Sonya became one of our Medical Watch kitties at the shelter. She was being monitored for kidney issues, body weight, and was placed in the lobby bathroom so she could be seen, but yet protected from other wandering cats.

After four months, Sonya just couldn't seem to catch a break. While trying to gain weight she suddenly developed a serious eye ulcer. After many treatments to try and save her eye we decided that we were done torturing her each day and that it would be best if the eye just came out. Sonya has recovered from her surgery and now spends her time resting near the front window just waiting to be adopted. The funding for Sonya's surgery as well as care of other senior cats at CASA is provided by a grant, "Medical Care for Special Cats, made possible by Lil BUB's Big Fund for the ASPCA."

Both of these stories show the power of a community coming together to improve the lives of animals, who have suffered through no fault of their own, and have nowhere else to turn. With your financial support, your volunteer efforts, and your collective thoughts, we will be able to continue helping other animals like Sky and Sonya in the future.

Prescriptions for Your Pet

NACo, the National Association of Counties, provides discounts for prescriptions not covered by insurance. If your pet is prescribed a medication, ask your veterinarian if the medication is also used to treat human conditions. Examples are medications for seizures, heart conditions, infections, allergies, pain relief, diabetes and anti-depressants used to treat behavioral disorders in animals.

Ask your veterinarian for a written prescription and take the prescription to a participating pharmacy along with your prescription discount card (provided to you in a joint effort of your local county government and the National Association of Counties (NACo)).

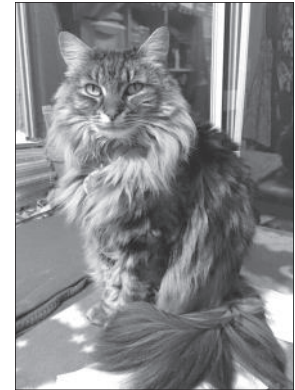

When we first decided to adopt Indira, we knew we were taking on a big commitment, and that she would be more of a “special needs” case than many other dogs. What we weren’t prepared for was just how quickly and completely she would capture our hearts.

In the beginning, Indira didn’t get excited about much. She was curious, but she was also cautious and wary. She didn’t quite trust anybody or anything. While it was fun to see her discover and get used to things like soft pillowy beds and everyday things we take for granted, it was heartbreaking to see her cower when we’d try to pet her, or look at us distrustfully when we fed her. We brought her into a home with 3 other large dogs, and we knew that she would quickly pick up on cues from them. Very soon after coming home with us, she started following Mom around the house while doing chores, and she played with her pack-mates. Not long after that, she started going to work with Dad a couple of days a week, and occasionally with Mom, socializing with people. Almost immediately, we discovered she loves car rides, so she gets to go on frequent outings. Almost every time one of her family leaves the house, she gets to go, too.

Only three months after bringing her home, Indira has bonded well with her family, dog AND human. She likes to give us baths. She plays very gently with her humans, and roughly with her pack-mates. She gets so excited when one of us comes home from work or school, she wags her tail so hard that her whole body sways and she dances and hops. She knows happiness...we get tail wags from her at something so simple as a smile and “Hi!” and once in a while we’ll even catch her wagging her tail in her sleep. 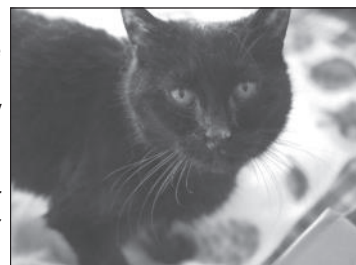

NEW - CASA Hospice Foster Homes

CASA recently began hospice foster program that will allow terminally ill animals to live the remainder of their days in loving homes while still under the auspices of CASA. Hospice status is issued at the shelter manager's discretion to animals who might otherwise pass away at the shelter from their terminal conditions and the lack of adopters for such cats. Hospice animals are those which have been evaluated by a veterinarian and have been given a limited period of remaining life and/or which have a diagnosed terminal medical issue. They are at a point where they are still stable, comfortable, and happy and will benefit physically and mentally by living in a home environment rather than the shelter.

Under the hospice foster program, medication, veterinary visits and special food costs are managed and paid for by CASA. Knowing this will hopefully encourage people to take terminally ill animals. In addition to providing a loving home, the hospice foster parent may be required to administer medication at regular intervals which may increase as the illness progresses. Some animals will pass naturally, but when the animal's discomfort and/or issues outweigh the positives in their life or they are then suffering, they will be helped along by one of our veterinarians.

Andi, our first hospice foster, has found her "forever home." Andi is a small gray cat who is about 14 years old. She was diagnosed with an aggressive and untreatable form of oral cancer during dental surgery on February 29, and moved to her foster home in early March. Prior to the surgery, Andi had not been eating well due to pain. Following surgery, she is eating very enthusiastically. She receives pain medication twice a day, which keeps her comfortable enough to enjoy playing with toy mice, chasing a laser, and sitting on windowsills to watch birds. She particularly loves napping on her foster father's lap. Her foster mother reports, "She's sleeping in her bed next to my computer as I type this, basking in the sun, looking very small and fragile. I can't tell you how good it feels to be able to give her a home for her last months, and watch her come out of her shell and begin to trust that she's really home. We think it is wonderful of CASA to give her this opportunity."

Before You Travel

- Get a clean bill of health from the veterinarian and update your pet's vaccinations. Obtain a health certificate showing proof of up-to-date inoculations, particularly rabies, distemper, and kennel cough.
- Ask the doctor about potential health risks at your destination (Lyme disease, heartworm infection) and the necessary preventive measures.
- Some owners believe a sedated animal travels more easily than one that is fully aware, but this is rarely the case. In fact, tranquilizing an animal can make travel much more stressful. Always consult a veterinarian about what is best for your pet, and administer sedatives only under the doctor's direction. NEVER give an animal medication that is specifically prescribed for humans. The dosage may be too high for an animal's much smaller body mass, or may cause dangerous side effects.
- If your pet is taking prescribed medicine, pack a sufficient supply plus a few days' extra. Also, take the prescription in case you need a refill.

- Depending on the length and nature of the trip and your pet's level of command response, an obedience refresher course might be a good idea. It's also a good idea to socialize your pet by exposing her to other people and animals (especially if she normally stays inside).
- Learn about your destination and find out what types of documentation will be required. Check into quarantines or other restrictions well in advance.
- Reconfirm all travel plans within a few days of your departure, especially with hotels and airlines; their policies may have changed after you made the reservations. If you plan to visit state parks or attractions that accept pets on the premises, obtain their animal regulations in advance.
- Seeing-eye dogs and other service animals are exempt from the regulations prohibiting pets on Amtrak and interstate bus lines. Local rail and bus companies may allow pets in small carriers, but this is an exception rather than a rule.
- The only cruise ship that currently permits pets is the Cunard Line's *Queen Mary 2* (on trans-Atlantic crossings); kennels are provided, but animals are accepted on a very limited basis. Some charter and sightseeing boat companies permit pets onboard.

Remember CASA in Your Will

By making a bequest to the Camano Animal Shelter Association (CASA) in your will, you can make a profound and lasting impact on the welfare of countless animals cared for at the shelter every year. When preparing your will, you make the decisions on how your possessions will be distributed. If you already have a will, you can write a codicil (an addendum) that names the Camano Animal Shelter Association as a beneficiary of your estate.

When naming CASA in your will, you may leave a specific dollar amount, a set percentage of your estate, or a particular property. To include CASA in your will, you must specify its proper name and street address. Your bequest can be simply stated; for example: "I give to the Camano Animal Shelter Association, 198 Can Ku Road, Camano Island, Washington 98282 (PO Box 1726, Stanwood, Washington 98292), federal tax ID number, 91-1913293, the sum of _____ dollars to be used for its general purposes." (If you are leaving insurance policies, land or other property, please describe it.) An attorney can advise you regarding taxes and other aspects of estate planning.

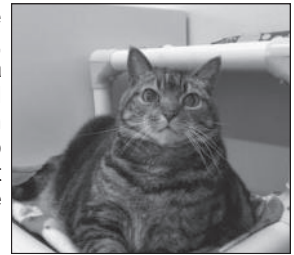
